PEF's History

In 1982, several business leaders, community activists, and teachers in Petaluma convened to develop funding solutions for area schools in response to major budget deficits throughout the California school system. The outcome was the creation of the Petaluma Educational Foundation (PEF), a privately funded, non-profit organization whose primary goal is to raise money in the community to benefit education. As of the end of the 2023-2024 academic year, thanks to the generosity and vision of our supporters, PEF has awarded a cumulative total of over \$9.3 million to students and schools in the Petaluma area through PEF Impact Grants and PEF Scholarships since the programs were established!



PEF Impact Grant for the Waugh School District Garden Program at Corona Creek & Meadow Elementary Schools PEF receives no state or government funding. The Foundation raises funds from individuals, corporations, organizations, and foundations. In addition, PEF manages Alphabet Soup Benefit Thrift Stores which support PEF's mission. PEF is designated by the Internal Revenue Service as a tax-exempt, non-profit, charitable 501(c)(3) organization.

Our tax ID is #94-2847212.

PEF serves 35 Transitional Kindergarten (TK) -12th grade schools in the Petaluma area. More than 12,000 students benefit annually from PEF grants and scholarships.

Over \$4.8 million in PEF Scholarships has been awarded to graduating seniors since 1990. This year we awarded \$263,934 in scholarships to members of the Class of 2024 planning to attend 2-year colleges, 4-year colleges, or vocational programs following their high school graduation.

Over \$4.5 million in PEF Grants has been awarded since 1982. In 2022-2023 we granted a total of \$219,714 with a special focus on:

- Literacy & Language Arts
- Fine Arts
- Math & Science
- PEF TECH Initiative & S.T.E.A.M.
- Humanities
- Athletics, Nutrition & Well-Being
- Vocational Education/Life Skills

PEF Invested/Endowed Funds total \$5,405,378 (as of December 2023). PEF is creating a lasting legacy with our General, Grant, and Scholarship endowments. PEF also manages several component funds for school-related organizations and clubs that benefit from our investment strategy.

LITERACY & LANGUAGE ARTS

2023-2024 PEF GRANTS: \$219,714

FACILITATE AND MOTIVATE READING ACCESS FOR OUR DUAL IMMERSION STUDENTS - \$15,000

Funding partners: Exchange Bank and PEF Fund the Future Donors
This grant will fund audiobooks in Spanish and English for all students in the Spanish
Immersion Program. Audiobooks will allow for some independence from the teacher
as well as offer students more exposure to language in both Spanish and English. This
program will also support dual immersion learners by providing a greater variety of
exposure to new books via audio that would otherwise not be accessible.
When learning in dual languages, hearing spoken language via audiobook is an
important step toward deepening language acquisition and reinforcing learning.
Audiobooks are another area of support for all learners to ensure every tool is being
utilized for students.

LITERACY FOR EMERGENT READERS \$14,940

Funding partners: The Larry Hillblom Foundation and PEF Fund the Future Donors McNear has successfully revamped their library

over the years with previous PEF grants. One piece of the reading program that required additional attention this year was the Emergent Readers program. This grant will launch the Take-Home Reading Program at McNear School



One of the best ways to accelerate reading growth and close the achievement gap is to provide opportunities for targeted skills in an individual's reading alongside focused literacy instruction. Research shows that bridging learning and literacy between home and school is especially important for young children. This program will encourage parents and children to engage in meaningful literacy experiences at home while supporting the literacy goals tied to reading instruction. Staff will partner with families by providing resources and training to help guide them in best practices when reading with their children at home.

Students directly impacted: 100 students in Kindergarten and 1st grade at McNear Elementary School

ART & MUSIC

CULTIVATING CONFIDENCE, CREATIVITY, AND ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE THROUGH MUSIC EDUCATION - \$15,000

Funding partner: Encore Events Rentals and PEF Fund the Future Donors This grant helps build a program that is essential to the mission of Spring Hill School: A whole child education and direct music instruction are vital to that mission. The grant will fund the foundation of a burgeoning music program. For Spring Hill, music literacy is essential to achieving a well-rounded education. Learning music from a young age helps brain development, strengthens memory, and increases the ability for creativity, self-expression, self-efficacy, and social skills. It also improves critical thinking and problem-solving skills. Students will learn to collaborate and interact with each other's differing talents and interests. When students regularly work on challenging musical arrangements and tasks, this helps to build reading and math literacy skills.

Students directly impacted: 220 students (100% of the student body) in Transitional Kindergarten - 8th grade at Spring Hill School

PEF PRESENTS LIVE THEATER - \$3,000

More than 800 students attended live performances at Petaluma's downtown Mystic Theater in December 2023 to see Pinocchio performed by Traveling Lantern Theater Company. These performances provide the opportunity to expose and inspire students' understanding of theater arts. Special thanks to Mystic Theater for the in-kind use of the iconic downtown Petaluma venue giving attendees an authentic live stage show experience.

PETALUMA YOUTH AG DAY - \$2,000 Funding partner: Mahoney Family Fund

Generations of Petaluma school children have participated in this event since 2005 where students learn about the important role of agriculture in our lives. They have the opportunity to see a cow milked, trek through a hay maze, pet farm animals, and watch sheepdogs at work while hearing from local agricultural organizations about their impact on the local economy.

SONOMA MOUNTAIN CHARTER PERFORMING ARTS UPGRADE \$14,565

Funding partners: County of Sonoma Board of Supervisors, Mary & Scott Farrar,

and PEF Fund the Future Donors Sonoma Mountain Elementary's charter focuses on arts and music, meaning every classroom is immersed in visual and performing arts. All classrooms receive instruction in music, art, dance, and movement. Additionally, the charter extends into the Sonoma Mountain Performing Arts for third through sixth grade where they learn the foundations of drama and work together in a vigorous weekly program to perform plays for the

community. This grant will fund new equipment necessary for seamless performances including updated lighting, a new sound system, and fresh, exciting costumes. These updates will also be integrated into classroom learning for all.

HEALTH & WELLNESS

CINNABAR GARDENING AND HABITAT RESTORATION - \$4,116

Funding partners: Trisha & Rick Young and PEF Fund the Future Donors
This grant will go towards programming that will help students learn about habitat
restoration, gardening, and growing food through hands-on activities. Students will
grow native plants and different crops while learning about the science at the same time.
Cinnabar has a long incorporated its hilltop campus views and landscape into classroom
learning, and this grant will further that tradition. Lessons such as continuing native
restoration and environmental conservation projects, measuring and building a new garden
by students, and experiencing the cycle of the seasons as it pertains to the environment
mean this grant offers something for every grade level. Students can incorporate their
lessons and learning into practical use by supplying ingredients for the campus salad bar.
Students directly impacted: 176 students in the Transitional Kindergarten - 8th grades at
Cinnabar Elementary School

WAUGHSOME GARDENS ARE GOOD FOR KIDS - \$7,489

Funding partners: Katy & Todd Verke and PEF Fund the Future Donors With long histories of student involvement in the garden and environmental science work at Meadow and Corona Creek schools, garden rejuvenation was an exciting prospect for the Waugh District. This grant will fund student tools, garden supplies, and curriculum. The district is looking forward to many aspects of learning from growing vegetables, to native plant and pollinator discussions, to planning for conservation and how today's actions impact the future. Students will enjoy lessons such as seed dispersal, the effects of seasons, creature investigations, and veggie taste tests. Students throughout the district will thrive alongside their garden by engaging in relevant academic lessons while cultivating various vegetables and plants through hands-on learning. Progress will be measured via current district benchmark assessments.

HEALTH & WELLNESS

2023-2024 PEF GRANTS: \$219,714

STUDENT WELLNESS CENTER AT KENILWORTH JUNIOR HIGH - \$14,966

Funding partners: Healthy Petaluma District & Foundation and Debra Dow & John Johnson Kenilworth is creating and implementing a Wellness Center for students to help promote social-emotional behavioral and physical well-being. Rates of mental health disorders have increased significantly over the past ten years, and with this, it has become more important than ever to offer a safe and calming space for students on campus to talk to a caring and trusted adult and take the time to manage their feelings and emotions. Students who are experiencing mental



health concerns have an increasingly more difficult time in attending school. The Wellness Center will be a place to learn coping strategies and self-regulation with support, allowing students to return to the classroom calmly and continue learning.

Students directly impacted: 834 (100% of the student body) in 7th and 8th grade at Kenilworth Junior High School

ROBOTICS AND ENGINEERING INSTRUCTION UPDATE - \$14,452

Funding partners: Andrea & John Barella

The Robotics and Engineering program at Kenilworth Junior High continues to expand and improve since its beginning five years ago and has become a popular STEM class with students. The program has increased its enrolled students by adding a third class, as well as four teams that compete in the Sonoma County Robotics Competition. This grant will enable the program to purchase new Spike LEGO kits with updated technology. The Robotics program will be able to expand its curriculum, include new, updated projects, and increase the number of teams and categories competing in the annual Sonoma County Office of Education (SCOE) Robotics Competition. In addition, the junior high students can collaborate with elementary school classes using LEGO Spike kits during the annual Petaluma City Schools Art Festival. Updated materials in this technology class ensure students are better prepared for future robotics classes and careers in engineering. Students directly impacted: 200 students in 7th and 8th grade at Kenilworth Junior High School

ADVANCING S.T.E.A.M. EDUCATION - \$50,000

Funding partners: Victor DeCarli Fund at PEF/Angela DeCarli and Richard DeCarli This special donor-advised fund grant to St. Vincent High has the goal to inspire students and help them gain a love for life-long learning in the science, technology, engineering, and math fields. To achieve this, they need to upgrade their STEM program by including new technologies, updated teaching methods, and provide ongoing professional development. One way to achieve this goal is to change their courses to project-based learning and real-world applications. Students will embark on a school-wide, experiential, learning journey in collaboration with a program called NEXMAP, a non-profit dedicated to these goals. This grant will go towards the necessary equipment such as interactive whiteboards and digital boards to put these projects in motion in elevating the St. Vincent High STEM program. Students directly impacted: 168 (100% of the student body) in 9th -12th grade at St. Vincent de Paul College Prep

PROJECT: ENGAGE, INSPIRE, AND LEAD \$14,686 Funding partner: Clover Sonoma In piloting a new researchbased science curriculum, **Discovery Education** Science, St. Vincent de Paul Elementary School aims to provide new opportunities for students focused on digital tools. This curriculum will engage students in new ways with fresh ideas in learning via hands-on and virtual investigating. These STEM activities will offer real-world applications. The grant will provide new technology and educational tools such as Chromebooks, iPads, and more, to improve student academic instruction and student achievement. Students directly impacted: 192 students (100% of the student body) in Kindergarten - 8th grade at St. Vincent de Paul **Elementary School**

INTRODUCTION TO DIGITAL MEDIA - \$14,570

Funding partners: Petaluma Market and Kristy & Ron Fedrick

This grant will go towards equipment necessary for a new class serving as an introduction to broadcasting, filmmaking, video production, and social media content creation. This program is a new elective offering and will help with seamless integration into the broadcast program at Petaluma High School. The main piece of the program is creating digital media content for podcasts. The introduction of this technology provides the students with the same skills and knowledge used beyond the classroom as in professional broadcast fields. Students will have access to the required equipment for this elective. These tools include the use of iPhones for cameras, video, and advanced editing capabilities through MacBook Pro, and wireless mics. Students will be ready to work immediately on various projects for a breadth of experience.

Students directly impacted: 50 in 7th and 8th grades at Petaluma Junior High School

MANUFACTURING COURSE GRANT - \$11,999

Funding partners: Victor DeCarli Fund at PEF/Angela DeCarli and Richard DeCarli The manufacturing course students at Petaluma High School design components on CAD software and then manufacture items in their lab facility. Students have even designed and manufactured parts for NASA that are going to the international space station and look forward to future NASA Hunch projects. The course uses engineering principles in the ultimate maker space. With the addition of the WAZER Waterjet the ability to manufacture frames and brackets made of sheet metal or thinner metal billets that cannot be produced on the current machines is a reality for students in this class. This machine uses high-pressure water and abrasive material to cut metal, ceramics, glass, plastics, and more. Typically, these machines are quite large and very expensive. However, the WAZER is designed to be an entry-level unit perfect for the education of students. This machine will also keep this work in-house instead of coordinating the tedious process of outsourcing these projects.

Students directly impacted: 130 students in 9th -12th grades at Petaluma High School

MEDIA STUDIO & FIELD REPORTING INSTRUCTION - \$14,952 Funding partners: Sally & Ned Foley, Carol Ann & Dan Libarle and Tasha & Troy Sanderson

Student interest in Broadcast Journalism classes has grown even more than expected, and while exciting, it has left Petaluma High School in need of additional equipment. Due to the increased enrollment, a second section of the Broadcast 1 class was added to the schedule. This year, a Broadcast 3 class was added to the already successful Broadcast 1 and 2 classes. This grant will go towards multiple facets of the program. Industry-standard equipment, specifically cameras, computers, and other broadcast technology will be added. A wireless remote package will allow students better live streaming capabilities from four cameras to eight. Adding a video switcher means the students can cover two events in a day instead of only one, expanding the program and

allowing for flexibility. Through these upgrades, students will ensure continued compliance with programs such as CTE Anchor Standards and learn technical and industry skills, including hard and soft skills that translate into many careers and potential jobs.
